You Gotta Fight, For Your Right, to be a Party

Lawsuits are an integral part of environmental policy in the United States. (If you are an attorney and that last sentence gave you an ego boost, [here](#) are some lawyer jokes to balance you out). Lawsuits allow those who are directly impacted by an action to be centered in the resolution of the conflict, and the threat of citizen suits (ideally) forces agencies and private actors to be on their [best behavior](#). However, this is a heavy burden for citizens to bear.

A conservation group in Michigan is choosing to bear this burden by [contesting the permit](#) that was [recently issued](#) to Nestle which increases their withdrawal rate from 250 gallons-per minute to 400 gallons per minute. Michigan granted this permit despite 80,000 comments in opposition. (It didn't help that at about the same time Michigan [stopped deliveries of free bottled water to Flint](#). It's unrelated, but the optics aren't great.) Much of the public outrage was generated by the fact that Nestlé gets the groundwater for nothing more than a \$200 per year DEQ permit. And that won't change under the new permit. The burden is now on this conservation group to prove that the permit decision was arbitrary and capricious.

The fight over the Michigan permit isn't over, but a small town in Victoria, Australia is paying the high cost of failure over their own groundwater battle. The town sued to prevent a farmer from extracting and selling groundwater as spring water to a subsidiary of the Japanese beverage giant Asahi. They not only lost their case but they have also been [ordered to pay](#) \$90,000 in legal fees. Yikes!

Thus, the rules and procedures of environmental lawsuits become in themselves environmental policy.

The Shape of Water
